WORSHIPDEFINED

Worship. Everybody worships.

Everyone, everywhere worships something: Whatever captivates the heart's affections, the mind's attention, and the soul's ambition, essentially, *has* our worship.

We worship everything from pop icons, to our jobs, to our favorite sports team.

While the object and method of worship varies, the act of worship does not.

Oftentimes, <u>our</u> worship is focused on ourselves; the pursuit of fame, wealth, and personal satisfaction becomes the focus of our wants and desires. But no matter how much we worship these things, they can never satisfy the deepest longings of our soul.

God has uniquely designed us with meaning and purpose; he has divinely created us in his own image. When we worship the creat<u>ed</u> and not the Creat<u>or</u>, we are left unfulfilled and unsatisfied. We deny God the worship that is rightfully his.

When we step into a relationship with God through his son Jesus, our relationship with God should become elevated above every other ambition, every other affection, and every other activity. It should change *everything* we do:

It begins to change the words we say, the decisions we make, the way we view our circumstances and see the people around us.

It changes our goals, desires, and pursuits. Instead of searching for meaning and purpose IN our life, {worship} becomes the meaning and purpose OF our life.

Worshipping God is not limited to singing a song on Sunday morning; its a *lifestyle* lived out in reverence to God, wherever he has placed you.

There is no sacred and secular divide, Worship involves all of our lives, not just one part.

That means we worship as we work, as we parent, as we go to school, as we gather round the table, as we suffer, as we compete, as we love, as we seek, as we create; all that we believe, think, say, and do should flow from our beating hearts of worship.

So what is worship?

It's the outpouring of our lives. Lead by the Spirit and rooted in God's truth, devoting all we are and all we do to Him, our Creator

Consecration Sunday Is Coming, May 7th

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

TAX-FREE TRANSFERS TO CHARITY

Did you know that older IRA owners have a different way to give to charity?

An IRA owner age 701/2 or over, can directly transfer, tax-free, up to \$100,000 per year to an eligible charity. This option can be used for distributions from IRAs, regardless of whether the owners itemize their deductions.

To qualify, the funds must be transferred directly by the IRA trustee to the eligible charity. Distributed amounts may be excluded from the IRA owner's income – resulting in lower taxable income for the IRA owner. However, if the IRA owner excludes the distribution from income, no deduction, such as charitable contribution deduction may be taken for the distributed amount.

Amounts transferred to a charity from an IRA are counted in determining whether the owner has met the IRA's required minimum distribution (RMD).

Consult your tax accountant to see if this option could be advantageous to you.

SALEM TO PARTICIPATE IN LOCAL SUMMER WORK CAMP 9th Annual Servants' Workcamp Northeast

OVERVIEW: Servants' Workcamp Northeast focuses on service in the Northeastern School District of York County. This is a local "Mission Trip" where volunteers can do everything as if they traveled to a distant location; however, they can enjoy their own hot shower and sleep in their own beds at night!

DATES: July 24-28, 2017; work all week, or one or two days

PROJECTS: Work could entail drywall, painting, roofing, flooring, yard work, and other minor construction/maintenance tasks.

POSSIBLE WORKDAY SCHEDULE:

7:00 Arrive, pack lunches, fellowship together

7:15 Devotions

7:30 Breakfast, finish packing lunches

8:00 Work Projects

12:00-1:00 Lunch

4:00 Wrap up on site

4:30 Return to Host Facility (communicate job status and material needs to Construction Coordinator)

4:45 Devotions/Debriefing

5:00 Dinner

AGES: encourage youth at least 14 years old to serve with a ratio of 1 adult to 5 youth; youth younger than 14 years are to serve with a parent, or at a minimum, to work beside a youth group leader on a 1 to 1 ratio. There is no upper age limit (or excuses) to serve Christ by serving others





Their content and morality are appalling. In the past year, however, a rebirth of values and Christian themes has appeared. I have personally watched each of the DVDs below, and I found them thought-provoking and Christ affirming. If you haven't seen these, all of them are appropriate for the whole family and are available in our library. Check them out!

Miracles from Heaven

This DVD is based on the incredible true story of the Beam family. When Christy discovers her 10-year-old daughter Anna has a rare, incurable disease, she becomes a ferocious advocate for her daughter's

healing as she searches for a solution. After Anna has a freak accident, an extraordinary miracle unfolds in the wake of her dramatic rescue that leaves medical specialists mystified, her family restored, and their community inspired.

The Boy Who Came Back from Heaven

This DVD tells the true story of an ordinary boy's most extraordinary journey. As you see heaven and earth through Alex's eyes, you'll come away with new insights on miracles, life beyond this world, and the power of a father's love.

Woodlawn: The True Story



This DVD is the epic Biblical story of the Resurrection as told through the eyes of a non-believer. Clavius, a powerful Roman military tribune and his aide, Lucius, are tasked with solving the mystery of what happened to Jesus in the weeks following the crucifixion in order to disprove the rumors of a risen Messiah and prevent an uprising in Jerusalem.

When high school history teacher Grace Wesley is asked a question about Jesus in class, her reasoned response lands her in deep trouble. The ensuing epic court case could expel God from the classroom and the public square once and for all.
