## WORSHIP MATTERS

I learned that Erie, PA had a community-wide, public campaign this summer that rallied people around the idea of taking children to worship.

Unified Erie — a broad-based coalition of law enforcement, social service agencies and government — based this strategy not on assumptions or anecdotal evidence, but on empirical data about what works. Data shows that children and teenagers who participate in a religious activity for at least an hour a week are happier, do better in school, are less likely to abuse alcohol and drugs, and are less inclined to engage in violent behavior.

Matthew Judd, pastor of Glenwood United Methodist Church, commented, "What I like is the data shows what people in the church, in the faith community already know, that faith matters.

Yes, faith matters, and the most fundamental expression of faith is worship. In worship we honor God and show devotion and gratitude to God for all the grace in our lives.

Disciples of Jesus need to worship and offer our lives to God because of God's mercy (Romans 12:1). When we worship, God blesses, inspires, teaches, and shapes us in powerful, wonderful ways. It is fundamental to our faith.

If worship matters for children and for whole communities, surely it matters for us. Pastor Debbie and I encourage you to make regular worship attendance a major part of your life.

So bring your family and invite your friends. There are plenty of blessings to go around.

### THE CONCEPT IS SO SIMPLE! IT IS CALLED ORANGE.

IT IS THE CONCEPT OF US TAKING THE YELLOW LIGHT OF CHIRST FROM A SUNDAY MORNING/EVENING MIXING IT TO THE RED UNCONDITIONAL LOVE OF A FAMILY THAT BEGINS THE MINUTE A CHILD LEAVES THE CHURCH BUILDING....AND BLENDING IT TOGETHER TO BLANKET A CHILD IN THE ORANGE THROUGHOUT THEIR WEEK.

IT IS LETTING CHILDREN & YOUTH KNOW THE STUFF THEY LEARN IN CHURCH ON A SUNDAY CAN HELP CARRY THEM THROUGH THE WEEK WHEN LIFE TENDS TO GET MESSY. AND IT WILL GET MESSY FROM TIME TO TIME. ORANGE IS LETTING THEM KNOW THAT THE PEOPLE THAT SURROUND THEM INSIDE THE CHURCH ON A SUNDAY MORNING ARE ALSO OUT "THERE" IN THE WORLD CHEERING THEM ON, PRAYING FOR THEM, CARING ABOUT THEM THROUGHOUT THE WEEK. YOU SEE....

All kids need the same thing. Whether they are white, black, Asian, Hispanic, fostered or adopted...only children, middle children, youngest children.... High risk, special needs, gifted, introverts, extroverts, strong-willed, or mild-tempered . . . All kids need the same thing.

While it may seem like kids need a lot of things. In fact, if you listen to the voices in our culture advocating for kids, you can very quickly become overwhelmed by all the things kids need.

They need a healthy diet. They need exercise. **They need play time**. They need study time. They need down time. They need to have a practical skill. They need to take more rigorous classes. They need better grades. They need better friends. They need medication. They need entertainment. **They need technology**. They need to get a job. They need to help around the house.

I'm not saying they don't need all these other things, too. But without the **one thing**, none of those things actually matters. In fact, without **the one thing**, you can't even begin to give them the other things they need. So what is this **one thing** that they need? It's pretty simple. Every kid needs for **us to show up**! We need to SHOW UP in their everyday lives. Perhaps when they think no one cares or they are feeling alone. Because growing up is hard.

Kids at every phase need adults who will show up predictably and consistently, over time. In fact, it's the one thing they need more than anything else. But the reason kids need consistent adults changes with each passing phase.

So, just HOW do we do this **one thing**? How do we know what to do and when?



VeggieTales: Puppies and Guppies

This 88-minute DVD contains 8 stories. In these hilarious adventures about pets, popcorn, jet packs and more, kids will laugh and learn what it means to be responsible and kind to others.

#### The Back to the Bible Sunday School Class News

Through October 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Back to the Bible Class will be studying *Five Marks of a Methodist: The Fruit of a Living Faith* by Steve Harper. This concise and compelling summary helps every United Methodist learn and remember the five identifiers that John Wesley set forth in *The Character of a Methodist*. A gem of a book, it answers in plain language, "How should United Methodists live?" and provides people with a clear and memorable unifying focus. As followers of Jesus who reach out to serve their neighbors, United Methodists love God, rejoice in God, give thanks, pray always, and love others. A Participant Character Guide and video study are included.

Beginning October 30<sup>th</sup> and lasting until Advent, our class will be learning from *Joseph: The Journey to Forgiveness* by Melissa Spoelstra. This 6-week study explores what God has to say to us about grace and forgiveness through Joseph's story of trial and triumph found in Genesis 37-50. As we study his dreams, betrayers, dysfunctional family, struggle to forgive, and journey toward common questions such as "How do I stop dwelling on the hurt?" and "Is forgiving someone excusing what happened?" Whether or not you're working through a hurtful situation right now, you can learn from Joseph how to release your past and present hurts to God and allow Him to do a supernatural work of forgiveness in your life. Student books and a video are included.

We would love for you to join us for one or both studies. We meet Sunday mornings from 9:30-10:30 in room 210. Why don't you give us a try?


