Summer should be a time to slow down. Breathe. Take it all in. Not rush around at the school-year pace.



This article is actually a reprint of an article I wrote for the Stimulus five years ago.

Forgive me if you are already familiar with this story, but I think it is a wonderful example of how the Holy Spirit works in our lives, and I want to share it with as many people as possible.

It started with a dream. I was a 35-year old stay-at-home mom to two rambunctious but adorable boys, one a toddler and one a preschooler. Teaching had always been my passion; however, I knew that when God blessed me with children that I would take time off work. I loved being home with the boys, but I was looking for a way to use my teaching degree in my spare time that wouldn't involve babysitters. Then one night a path opened up for me.

The dream presented itself as a tutorial of how to set up a church library. Details flashed in my mind of how to organize the books with every detail. I woke up around 6:30AM and sat straight up in bed. Adrenaline rushed through me as I shook my husband Brent up and started giving him elaborate details about the dream. Brent told me that he only heard half of what I was saying; I was so excited that I was hardly making sense.

Without thinking about what time it was, I flew into the kitchen and proceeded to call Conrad Page. For those of you who never knew Conrad, he was the lay leader of our church for years, and he was well-known among pastors and other lay leaders of the Central Pennsylvania Conference. Conrad listened patiently as I shared with him all the details about my library dream. When I was finished, he said to me, "Kathy, it is evident that God is at work today. Last night we had a meeting, and we decided that it was time for our church to have a library. You were the first name on our list to call to see if you would be interested in being our librarian. I was going to call you as soon as I had my breakfast." I still get shivers when I think about that morning. I don't know who else was at the meeting or even what type of meeting it was, but Conrad and I were both shocked at what had happened. I didn't know anything about the plans for a library. Conrad didn't know about my prayers for a way to use my reading specialist degree while staying at home. Why did I call Conrad and not our pastor at that time, Mike Minnix? Was God involved? To Conrad and I, it was clear that God was working through us. Twenty-five years later I am blessed to still be our church librarian. Many individuals have helped in so many different ways.



Report on 2021 Annual Conference

The theme of this year's conference was: A Vision of the Beloved Community

As Bishop Jeremiah Park explained, the Beloved Community is all about love and fulfilling the vision that Jesus has for how we live together. In this vision, we would understand that, as a human race, we share a common destiny and that whatever affects one of us directly, affects all of us indirectly. He reminded us that, above all else, we are to love God and love others as ourselves.

In keeping with this vision, several resolutions were passed by majority vote. They included:

Mental Health: The Conference will observe Mental Health Awareness Month, Suicide Prevention Month, and National Recovery Month as well as Mental Illness Awareness Week.

Disability Awareness: The Conference will celebrate the contributions of the disabled in our congregations through a Disability Awareness Sunday.

Call Toward Unity: Members are asked to work toward unity and creating space for every church, lay person, and clergyperson to live out our convictions, as we wrestle with different understandings of human sexuality and sin. We are also asked to do no harm in words or actions toward fellow United Methodists during disagreements.

The Good News: The Conference renewed its commitment to reach all people with the Good News of Jesus Christ, Hope of the World.

Unity in Mission: Among other things, this one asks us to "live out unity in diversity for the sake of our mission and as an answer to Jesus' prayer that we may be one." **Conversion Therapy:** The Conference is asked to urge the PA State Legislature to ban conversion therapy in the state in order to protect and uphold the dignity, rights, and liberty of the LBGTQA+ persons in the commonwealth.

Bishop Park, who is retiring, introduced Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi and Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball who will replace him. These two will share episcopal coverage for the Susquehanna Conference, the Western Pennsylvania conference, and the West Virginia Conference. There is no plan to join these conferences. Bishop Moore-Koikoi and Bishop Steiner Ball reiterated the importance of the beloved community and shared a vision of collaboration and innovation.

There were also reports and actions by the Council on Finance and Administration, the new Laity Board, the UM Stewardship Foundation, the Nominations Committee, the Board of Pension and Health, Trustees, the Commission on Equitable Compensation, the Leadership, and the Young People's Ministry Council. As there is not enough space here to detail all of these reports and actions, we refer you to <u>https://susumc.org</u> for more information on these or the resolutions described above.

The first day of the Conference concluded with a service of remembrance for all those who passed away or were impacted by COVID-19; and the second day opened with a Juneteenth worship service which included words of love for all, no matter the difference, no matter how hard it is. There was also time taken to honor Bishop Park as he retires and for him to say goodbye to the Conference. In his concluding remarks, Bishop Park said,

"The only way to be a church in Christ is to be Alive!"

May we at Salem be Alive!
